Thank you so much to everyone who has been helping with our many events and activities leading up to next Tuesday, our final day to vote. Although we had many events impacted by storms, we gave at least 12 presentations on the amendments on the ballot, distributed 7,000 nonpartisan voter guides in three languages, and helped hundreds of voters register, change their addresses, request vote-by-mail ballots, or find vote411.org for information.



As I mentioned in my last email, we are now helping the national Election Protection coalition monitor the Canvassing Board Meetings in Hillsborough and Pasco Counties. If you can help provide coverage for the election night meeting in Pasco County, please let me know. I think we have the rest covered, but many of us are poll workers and can't help on Election Day.

Reports are that voter turnout numbers are high as compared with this date four years ago, but I know that many of you are out canvassing to ensure that the momentum continues. Preaching to the Converted

We vote. It's in our name. If you haven't voted, however, or know people who haven't voted, please read on.

Early voting in Hillsborough County is 7 am to 7 pm, **through Nov. 3**. For a list of early voting sites and real-time wait times in Hillsborough County, go to Early Voting. To enjoy food and music while you vote on Nov. 3, check out the NAACP's Souls to the Polls events.

Early voting in Pasco County is 7 am to 7 pm, **through Nov. 2**. For a list of early voting sites and real-time waits, see Early Voting Locations and Wait Times.

Mail-in ballots can be dropped off at early voting sites during early voting hours. It is too late to use the U.S. Postal Service to get the ballots to the SOE by 7:00 pm Tuesday.

On Election Day, Nov. 5, polls are open 7 am to 7 pm., N.B. on election day, mail-in

ballots are *only* accepted at the offices of the SOE. Mail-in ballots cannot be dropped off at polling places on election day.

Getting Out The Vote

The Center for Artistic Activism suggests the following tactics for getting out the vote.

- **Be the proof**: People love to join a team. Celebrate that you're engaged in the election and that so many people are. Encourage your communities to join you in the social fun of civic participation.
- Be the pressure: Create your own local actions to help people vote. Use CAA tools, reach out if you have questions and tell CAA how it's all going.
- Be the positivity: Contribute to the good kind of noise. We always believe that the so-called "impossible" is truly possible. Imagine winning because we have, we can, and we will.
- **Be you:** If you or someone you know is unsure about anything voting-related, ask a Voter Concierge.

Amendment 4

Remember, constitutional amendments in Florida now require 60% of voters to vote yes. Join Floridians Protecting Freedom (FPF) on Super Saturday, Nov. 2, 10 am to 1 pm, at 350 W. Hillsborough Ave. in Tampa to get out more voters who are concerned about women's and girls' health care. See more here: yes4florida/event.

If you are a medical doctor, join FPF in talking to Tampa voters on Sunday, Nov. 3, 12:30-2:30 pm. More here: yes4florida/event.

The Florida League's 2024 Nonpartisan Voter Guide is available. Click to view the guide in English, Spanish, and Haitian Creole. It is packed with information to prepare Florida voters for the elections, including:

Why We Do the Things We Do

LWV uses Google analytics to track how many people are coming to VOTE411 and how they interact with the website. What did the LWV find? In 2020, between January 1 and December 31, 6.1 million voters turned to VOTE411. In 2024, between January 1 and October 23, **6.2 million voters** turned to VOTE411. That means Vote411 has already surpassed the number of users from the entire 2020 cycle and still had some of its busiest days ahead!

This increase in users is due in part to all your hard work promoting and sharing VOTE411 in your communities.


