legislators regarding our legislative priorities, pop into committee meetings, and watch each chamber with an eagle eye as they conduct business and pass legislation.

• The first initiative, the **Right to Clean and Healthy Waters Amendment**, seeks to empower Floridians to better hold our government accountable when it comes to Florida waters. This amendment is crucial for protecting our environment and

### **A Longer Perspective**

#### Classical Antiquities Lecture: Citizen Participation in Ancient Athens

After the U.S. Presidential Elections in November, it is perhaps fitting to return to the birthplace of democracy, Athens, around the 6th through 4th century BCE.

Dr. Jennifer Roberts traces the political reforms that led to the breakdown of the power of the nobility and the rise of popular government within the larger context of ancient Greek history. As well as discussing the women and the enslaved population excluded from participation in government, Dr. Roberts will explore the Athenians' rationale for denying citizenship to immigrants and their descendants in the context of anxiety about

immigration in the United States, beginning with the founding era. Among those who did belong to the citizen body, she will ask how the Athenians arranged to involve men (not women) of all social classes in government.

Identifying eight strategies for maximizing citizen participation, she will explore how the Athenians' approach might be adapted to the large nation-states of the modern world, the United States in particular. Tampa Museum of Art, March 23. For tickets and more information, click here.

All vote-by-mail requests in Florida expired on December 31, 2024. Those who would like to have a vote-by-mail ballot mailed to them for elections taking place between January 1, 2025, and December 31, 2026, must submit a new vote-by-mail request. This applies to all voters, even if they voted by mail in the 2024 General Election.

In her book, Dr. Poole tells the stories of well-known explorers and voyagers who traveled through Florida and wrote about their experiences. Their words and paths from the colonial period to the twentieth century reveal what these places have become. Highlighting the Florida that was and the Florida that exists now, Dr. Poole tells a revealing story about the state's natural history and changing human perceptions of it in hopes of enlightening audiences and inspiring them to take their own journey. This presentation features the stories of over two dozen well-known authors of the past and present who found inspiration and a haven, including Ernest Hemingway, Judy Blume, Tennessee Williams, and more. How fortunate the Gasparilla Festival of the Arts is this weekend and the weather is supposed to be beautiful! Head to Julian B. *Jennifer Steinkamp: Madame Curie* celebrates two female trailblazers: scientist Marie Curie (Polish-French, 1876-1934) and artist Jennifer Steinkamp (American, b. 1958).

Curie remains the only woman awarded two Nobel Prizes for her groundbreaking scientific discoveries and research. Born nearly a century later, Steinkamp is internationally recognized for her monumental installations that unite art with technology. TMA, through August 10.

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The X Factor: Latinx Artists and the Reconquest of the Everyday looks to historical, recent and commissioned works by key Latinx artists to engage, depict, and challenge the underlying complexities of identity. X Factor underscores a period of political and creative ferment in which fundamental redefinitions of both society and identity abound. USF Contemporary Art Museum through March 8.

### **Music and Foreign Policy**

Beginning in the 1950s, the U.S. State Dept. and the U.S. Information Agency used jazz—one of America's great cultural creations--as a diplomatic tool to counter Soviet propaganda.

Great musicians like Louis Armstrong, Duke Ellington, and Dizzy Gillespie became global ambassadors of American culture while struggling with the challenges of the Civil Rights movement at home. Searching for a balance, they sought answers through the compositions they created, explored the new cultures they were introduced to, and inspired musicians around the world.
