

Protest Unethical Detentions



Don't Miss this Ride



Please join the HCLWV on Nov. 13 at the live performance of Cadillac Crew at Studio@620 in St. Pete. It doesn't just tell a forgotten chapter of Civil Rights history – it spotlights the women of Tampa Bay who've been lighting up our stages since.

Directed by Erica Southerlin, Cadillac Crew unites four powerhouse performers whose artistry has shaped the region's creative landscape. Together, they bring raw truth and electric chemistry to a story about women who organized, inspired, and led from the margins. In addition to exploring why we know so little about the women who were essential to advancing civil rights, the show makes clear that the work of equity and social justice has always been strongest when led by a diverse coalition of women.

Because the League of Women Voters was instrumental in creating the Wednesdays in Mississippi program on which the play is based, the HCLWV has reserved a block of 10 seats for the Nov. 13 show. Studio@620 will charge us \$33 per ticket as opposed to the normal price of \$40. Please come and bring your friends and family. Send an email to Voter@hclwv.org to reserve your seats. Please do this no later than Nov. 3 so we can adjust the number of seats we need.

The show is produced by Tampa's Powerstories Theatre, which has dedicated itself to producing works by and about strong women and girls. Powerstories invites us to "ride South just as our foremothers did, to connect with our shared herstory of civic duty, leadership, and resilience but, most of all, to be energized by the impact of collective action."

Speak Truth to Power in Pasco

The Pasco County Legislative Delegation consists of seven members of the Florida Legislature: Florida Senate (three Senators) and Florida House of Representatives (four Representatives) who represent all or parts of Pasco County.

The delegation will meet in public on Nov. 10, at 10 am at Pasco Hernando State College, 10230 Ridge Rd., New Port Richey, 33654. **All speaker requests must be submitted prior to Nov. 3**, along with seven copies for the delegation to be delivered to Representative Holcomb at 2955 Landover Blvd., Spring Hill, 34608. According to the delegation chair, we can sign up to speak at the event but public comments are the last item on the agenda and our comments may end up limited to two minutes instead of three. We Spoke Truth in Hillsborough

Over 400 people showed up to talk to the Hillsborough County legislative delegation on Nov. 21, including many HCLWV members and allies who made their opinions known. Among them, Teresa Potter spoke to the unconstitutionality of having new voting maps drawn in a mid-decade redistricting based on partisan grounds rather than new census numbers; Sandy Sroka spoke in favor of retaining HART's bus routes; Norin Dollard asked the delegation to implement legislation passed in 2023 that would make 42,000 children eligible for CHIP, to implement legislation passed in 2020 that would bring \$200 million in school-based Medicaid funding, and to make DCF reduce our SNAP error rate so that state funding would not be needed to replace lost federal funds; Pat Hall spoke against insurance company executives providing money to elected officials in order to influence insurance regulations; and Ami Marie Granger Welch, Damaris Allen & Betsy Braden spoke against a new Florida Board of Education rule that

allows Schools of Hope charter schools to move into empty classrooms in our public schools at the expense of public schools. Damaris also spoke against switching to a more political elected superintendent of schools and Ami also spoke against increased voucher spending at the expense of our public schools. We also heard from Paul Carder from the St. Petersburg league who spoke on the importance of the National Popular Vote Interstate Compact.

Before the delegation heard from the audience, they presented the bills they consider most important in the upcoming legislative session. Michael Owen wishes to expand the BOCC to nine single-member districts and update procedures for redistricting, appointments, and charter amendments. He also wants to make the Hillsborough Superintendent of Schools an elected position. The third bill he presented would create a Land Reserve Stewardship District in Hillsborough County, which would have the power to plan, finance, and manage infrastructure, services, and long-term development within its borders. Finally, Susan Valdes wishes to remove the BOCC's authority to levy ad valorem taxes on behalf of the Tampa Port Authority.

National Walk to School Day *by Emily Hinsdale*

Hillsborough County celebrated its largest National Walk to School Day event in history this October! With 35 schools registered to take part, an estimated 5,000 students participated in this annual national activity promoting safe and healthy routes to school. Sidewalk Stompers, thanks to a donation from transportation engineering firm AtkinsRealis, offered materials and prizes for all schools.



Tampa Mayor Jane Castor and Hillsborough County Public Schools Superintendent Van Ayres joined Sidewalk Stompers at Roosevelt Elementary School in honor of the school's 100th birthday and 10th year partnering with Sidewalk Stompers on a weekly walking program.

(Ed. note: Emily is the founder of Sidewalk Stompers and continues to expand the program each year with new schools and more families. She really deserves our thanks and congratulations for this effort to keep safe routes to schools in the minds of our local officials.)

West Riverwalk by Emily Hinsdale

On October 28, Tampa leaders current and past broke ground on the West Riverwalk Expansion Project that will add mileage and enhancements to a connected bike and sidewalk route on the west side of the Hillsborough River, ultimately creating a 12-mile continuous pathway that extends from Ballast Point Park to Tampa Heights. The route will offer transportation options tying together schools, homes, businesses, and city facilities.

The West Riverwalk is funded through a \$24 million federal BUILD grant, a \$10,000 West Tampa Community Redevelopment Agency (CRA) contribution, \$8 million from Tampa's Community Investment Tax, and additional funds in future bonds.

Voter Information Events

Ida Williams Campbell and Teresa Potter tabled at the Beulah Baptist Institutional Church during a Cybersecurity Defense Workshop on October 18, using the opportunity to provide voter information and stir up the votes for the District 5 election among professionals, businesses, educators and the general public.





League members spent time tabling over two weekends in LUSH stores at International Plaza and Brandon Exchange for National Voter Education Week. We also tabled at the Oct. 9th District 5 City Council Runoff Candidate Forum in Tampa, sponsored by the Tampa Heights Civic Association. We expect to be at many events next year, as we head into the 2026 midterm elections, so please be sure you are certified to table for the League so you can help in our community!



We also tabled at Goodwill stores in Wesley Chapel, Brandon, and Tampa. It was a busy couple of months.

Hillsborough County Neighborhood Grants

Hillsborough County [Neighborhood Relations](#) is now accepting applications for the 2026 Neighborhood Mini-Grant Program. Eligible neighborhood associations can apply for funds up to \$5,000 to strengthen and engage their communities through innovative and creative community projects.

Last year's grant recipients included 16 neighborhoods with projects ranging from a neighborhood spring fling event to a green space reclamation project, a Free Little Library fixture, and a bocce court canopy and paver installation. Palma Ceia Neighborhood Association hosted a pop-up art event spotlighting local businesses and celebrating creativity. Magnolia Lakes POA cleared overgrown vegetation, planted Florida-friendly landscaping, and created a peaceful space for residents to relax in and enjoy.

Banned Book of the Month *by Izzy Miletic, Forbidden Florida Reads*

A Clockwork Orange by Anthony Burgess was published in 1962.

BANNED in Alachua, Brevard, Clay, Escambia, Flagler, Hillsborough, Lee, Nassau, Okaloosa, Orange, Palm Beach, Pasco, Pinellas, Polk, Santa Rosa, St. Johns, Union, and Volusia county public schools

A Clockwork Orange was the most banned book during the '24 -'25 school year, according to PEN America.

Set in a dystopian future, the novel begins with a teenager named Alex embarking on a violent crime spree. Without empathy, Alex rapes a woman in her home before being arrested by the police. To shorten his sentence, Alex undergoes an experimental rehabilitation treatment that conditions him to feel ill at the thought of violence.

The story explores the necessity of free will in the journey to redemption. Removing a person's capacity for evil robs them of their humanity. It makes them more like


“clockwork oranges” (machines) than people. The novel raises valuable questions about punishment, rehabilitation, morality and the role of the justice system.

Since *A Clockwork Orange*'s release, censors have attempted to dismiss these complex ideas by claiming the book is needlessly violent. The 2025 resurgence of this trend focuses on the “pornographic” content of the book. Censors point to the sexual violence of the main character, which is meant to highlight his immorality - not glorify it.

Orange County Public Schools removed *A Clockwork Orange* “as a result of State Board of Education discussion.” While there is no evidence that the FL DOE directly ordered the removal, it reflects a growing trend. In 2024, South Carolina, Utah, and Tennessee enacted policies that enable state-wide “no-read” lists. As Florida remains the top book-banning state for the third year in a row, it may soon follow their lead.

Calling all green thumbs! The City of Tampa's Parking Division is accepting applications through Nov. 5 from residents interested in securing gardening beds in its new Parking Community Garden. Participation is FREE!

Located by the side of the Whiting Street Garage, the garden will feature 54 raised beds (2'x2'x4'), with 41 available to City of Tampa residents ages 18 and older. Gardening tools will be available on site.

A lottery system will be used to select participants from the list of applicants.

The garden is intended to;

- Encourage residents to spend more time outdoors.
- Foster healthy eating habits through the cultivation of fresh, organic foods.
- Build community and inclusion through a shared interest in gardening.
- Activate underutilized City property for community benefit.
- Provide hands-on education about water reclamation, recycling, propagating and cultivating crops, and composting.

Guns and Groceries

All Florida Publix stores now allow the open carry of firearms, unlike Walmart, Kroger, Target, Winn Dixie, and Aldi, which have all banned open carry. You can let your local Publix manager know how you feel. You can also send an email to Publix CEO Kevin Murphy by clicking [here](#). Let both know that you will shop elsewhere until Publix puts people over guns and protects customers, associates, and communities by banning open carry in all its stores.

Something to watch out for is that a bill has been filed in the Florida House to lower the age to purchase a long gun from 21 to 18. There is a chance this will get decided in the state court, as was the open carry decision.
